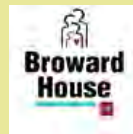

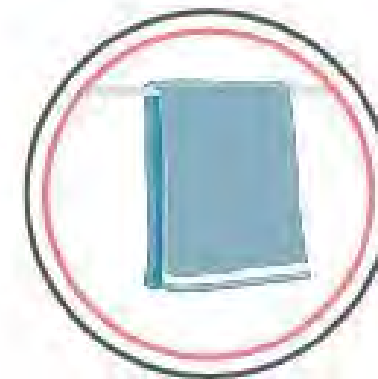

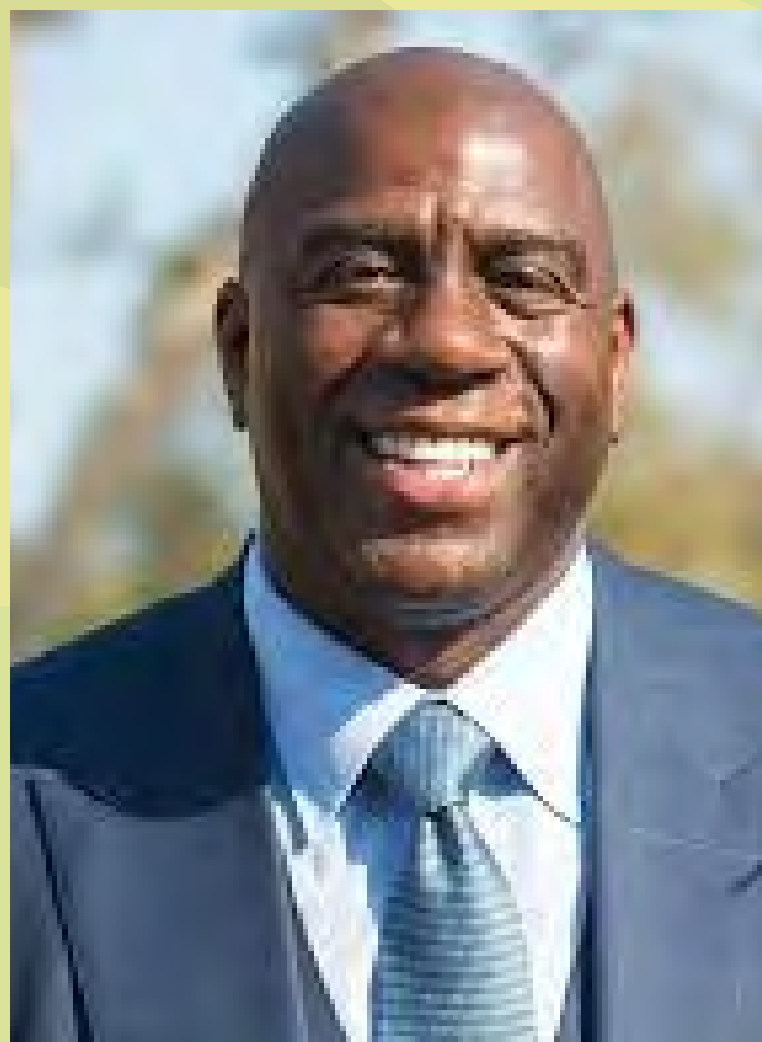

Answer #3



Magic Johnson

Earvin "Magic" Johnson Jr. is a former professional basketball player. Regarded as one of the greatest point guards of all time, he played for the Los Angeles Lakers in the NBA. In 1991, he became one of the first sports stars to go public about his HIV status. His announcement helped to change the public perception of HIV and challenge negative stereotypes.

What are “PrEP” and “PEP”?



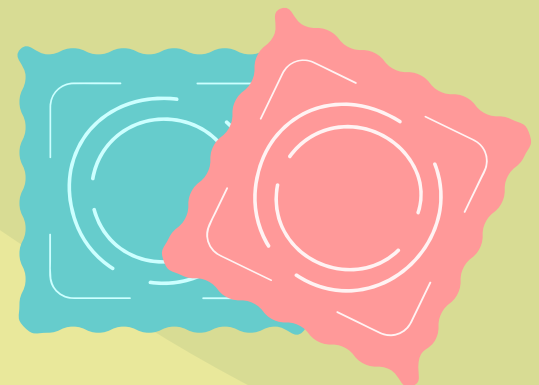
Answer #4

PrEP protects you from HIV ***before*** exposure



PEP protects you from HIV ***shortly after*** exposure

PrEP and PEP ***do not*** protect you from other sexually transmitted infections. It is important to practice safe sex – such as using condoms – while on PrEP or PEP.

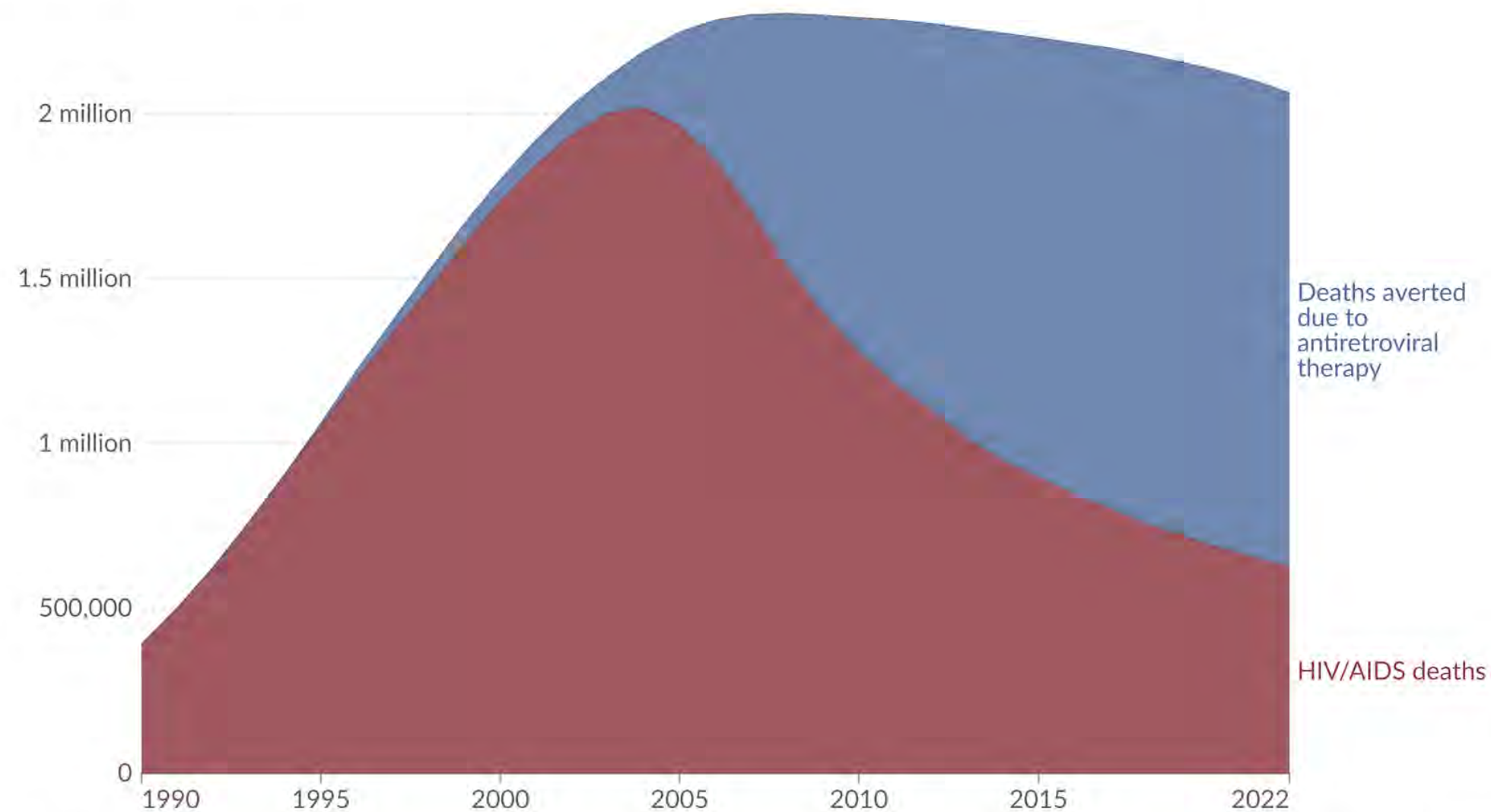

1. **HIV/AIDS:** Acquired immunodeficiency syndrome (AIDS) is a condition that describes the most advanced stages of HIV infection. It is defined by the occurrence of at least one of more than 20 life-threatening cancers or "opportunistic infections" that can take advantage of a weakened immune system.

2. **Antiretroviral therapy:** Antiretroviral therapy (ART) is a long-term medical treatment for HIV/AIDS. It works by suppressing the virus from multiplying in the body. This keeps the infection under control and helps to prevent the disease from progressing.

Answer #5

FALSE. In 1996, the first antiretroviral (ART) drugs were developed. That year, AIDS-related deaths dropped by a whopping 42%, and have continued to fall since then. Today, thanks to improvements in the effectiveness of treatment with ART, people with HIV who are diagnosed early and who get and stay on ART can keep the virus suppressed and live long and healthy lives.

Question #6

**True or False:
Only LGBT people can be
diagnosed with HIV.**



Answer #6

FALSE. When it was first discovered, HIV/AIDS was widely believed to be an illness that only affected homosexuals. However, it was analyzed with the time that people can get the virus through heterosexual sex as well. Anyone regardless of age, race, gender, or sexuality can be affected.



Question #7

**How many tickets were sold for
The Freddie Mercury Tribute Concert
For AIDS Awareness in 1992?**



Answer #7

72,000

When Queen singer Freddie Mercury died from complications arising from a long battle with AIDS, his bandmates quickly decided the best way of honoring him would be with a concert to raise money for AIDS research. The list of performers included Metallica, U2, Def Leppard, Guns N' Roses, David Bowie, Robert Plant, Elton John, Annie Lennox, Liza Minnelli, Elizabeth Taylor, and George Michael.



Question #8

Who was the first fictional character with HIV?





Answer #8

The character Michael Pierson, portrayed by actor Aiden Quinn, from the 1985 made-for-tv movie *An Early Frost*. He is a lawyer who goes home to tell his family that he is gay and was diagnosed with AIDS. It was viewed by 34 million households in its initial airing, the highest rated show of the night, even beating Monday Night Football. The film won three Emmy Awards, a Golden Globe, and a Peabody Award.

Question #9

What does it mean when a person with HIV is “undetectable”?

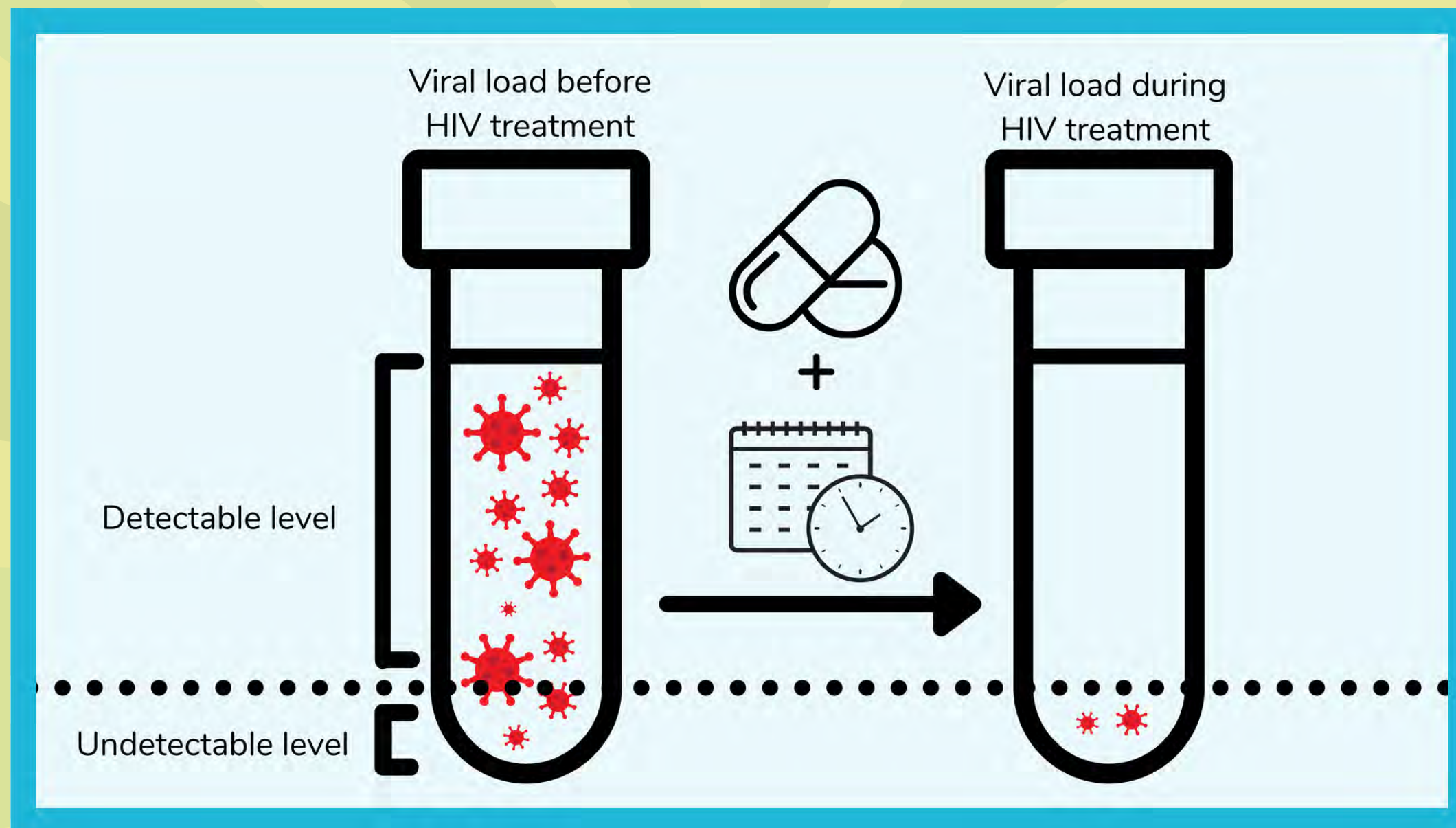


Answer #9

Undetectable means that there is so little virus in the blood that a lab test can't measure it. For many people living with HIV, getting to an undetectable viral load is a key step in their treatment journey.

Undetectable=Untransmittable

A person with HIV who is undetectable **cannot spread** HIV to another person.



Question #10

Who was Ryan White?



Answer #10

Ryan White was an American teenager who became a national poster child for HIV/AIDS in the United States after his school barred him from attending classes following a diagnosis of AIDS. He was one of the highly visible people with AIDS who helped change the public perception of the disease. In August 1990, four months after Ryan White's death, Congress enacted The Ryan White Comprehensive AIDS Resources Emergency (CARE) Act, in his honor. It is the largest federally funded program for people living with HIV/AIDS.

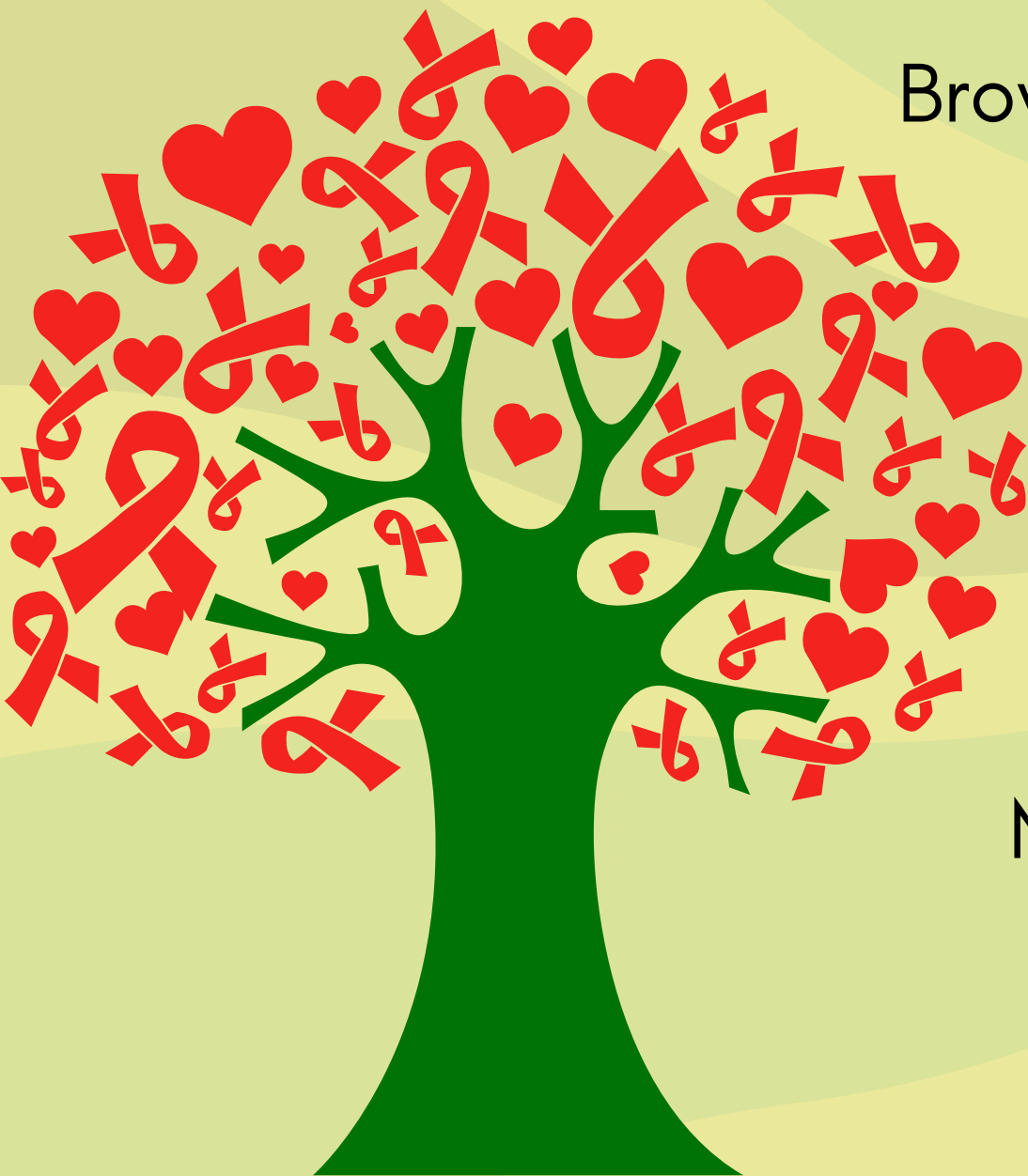

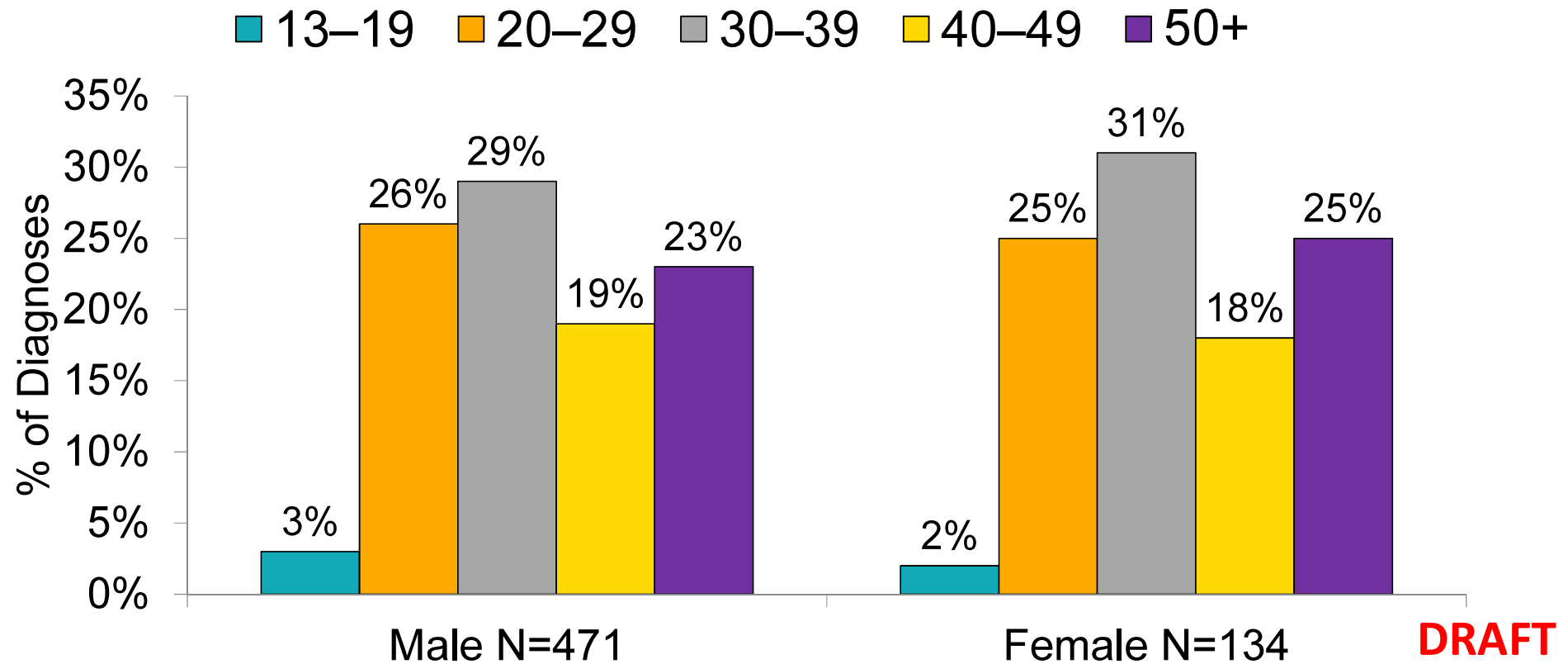

Adult HIV Diagnoses by Sex and Age at Diagnosis in 2022 in Broward County



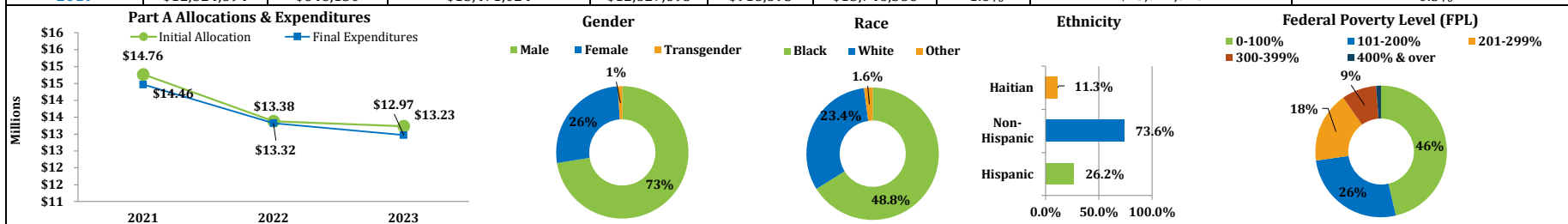

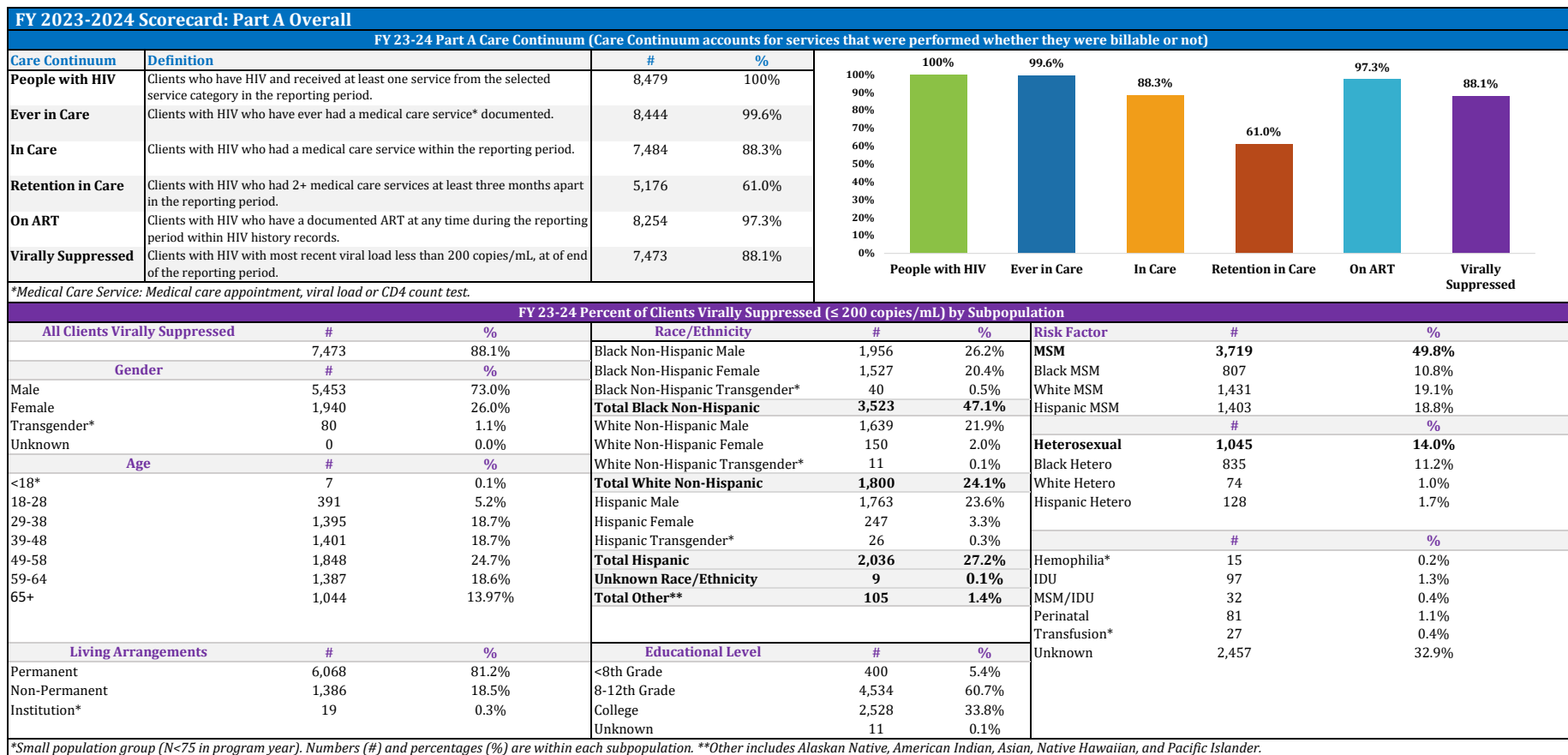
