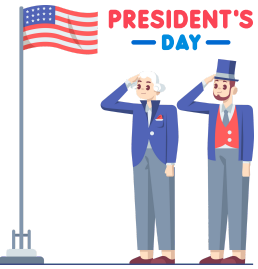

HIV Health Services Planning Council (HIVPC): Continuously monitors, evaluates, and improves the quality of HIV care for Ryan White Part A and MAI-funded patients.		
Executive Committee (EXEC): Oversees the HIV Integrated Prevention and Care Plan, work of HIVPC committees, recommendations, and grievance resolution. Sets HIVPC agendas, manages conflicts of interes, and review attendance.		
Priority Setting and Resource Allocation Committee (PSRA): Recommends priorities and allocates Ryan White Part A funds based on data review. Develops, monitors, and refines eligibility, service definitions, and strategies to meet community needs.		
Quality Management Committee (QMC): Ensures high-quality HIV care by developing outcomes and indicators. Oversees standards of care, evaluates programs, assesses client satisfaction, and training.		
Membership/Council Development Committee (MCDC): Recruits and screens applicants to ensure the Council meets demographic requirements. Provides recommendations, orientation, training for new members.		
Community Empowerment Committee (CEC): Engages in community outreach to Ryan White Part A consumers to inform them about opportunities to participate in the HIV Planning Council and provide input.		
System of Care Committee (SOC): Evaluates the system of care and the impact of policies on people living with HIV in Broward County. Plans and coordinates care across diverse groups to improve access and reduce disparities.

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Broward County Human Services Department AIDS Pharmaceutical Assistance (Local) Service Delivery Model

The Service Delivery Model serves as a minimum set of standards to be followed by all providers of AIDS Pharmaceutical Assistance (Local) services funded by the Broward County Human Services Department through its Community Partnerships Ryan White Part A Program.

For purposes of this Service Delivery Model (SDM), the term “provider” means any entity or group that has an agreement with Broward County Human Services. The term “Client” describes an individual who is eligible for County-funded services. As capitalized, the “Agreement” refers to the executed contract between the County and the provider.

I. PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

The Health Resources and Services Administration’s (HRSA) Local Pharmaceutical Assistance Program (LPAP) is operated by a RWHAP Part A or Part B (non-ADAP) recipient or subrecipient as a supplemental means of providing ongoing medication assistance when a HRSA RWHAP ADAP has a restricted formulary, waiting list and/or restricted financial eligibility criteria.¹

In Broward County, the Local Pharmaceutical Assistance Program is referred to as AIDS Pharmaceutical Assistance (Local) program and is operated by the Part A Ryan White HIV/AIDS Program (RWHAP) as a supplemental means of providing medication assistance to clients when the AIDS Drug Assistance Program (ADAP) has a restricted formulary, waiting list, or restricted financial eligibility criteria.

AIDS Pharmaceutical Assistance (local) includes local pharmacy assistance programs implemented by Part A to provide HIV/AIDS medications to clients.

The LPAP program is not funded by the AIDS Drug Assistance Program (ADAP) earmark funding; does not take the place of the ADAP program; may not be used to make direct payments of cash/vouchers to a client; and shall not impose charges on clients with incomes below 400% of the Federal Poverty Level (FPL).

II. KEY SERVICE COMPONENTS AND ACTIVITIES

In addition to the AIDS Pharmaceutical Assistance (Local) SDM, all providers must adhere to the minimum requirements set forth in the [Broward County Ryan White Part A Universal SDM](#). Providers must also adhere to standards and requirements set forth in the [Broward County, Human Services Department, Provider Handbook for Contracted Service Providers](#), individual contracts, and applicable contract adjustments. MCM providers must refer to their individual contract for service-specific client eligibility requirements. MCM providers must comply with applicable State and/or Federal standards and guidelines relevant to services delivered within this service category.

The AIDS Pharmaceutical Assistance (Local) program is critical to maintenance and management of HIV infection. The coordination of this service with other medical and support services can in many cases improve and maintain a client's quality of life over an extended period, which is consistent with the Public Health Services Guidelines and other treatment protocols.

The AIDS Pharmaceutical Assistance (Local) is designed to supply physician-ordered, Food and Drug Administration (FDA) -approved pharmaceuticals based on the approved Ryan White Formulary Listing and include medical supplies and/or devices needed to administer drugs. Drugs and medical supplies shall be dispensed routinely as prescribed, or as a short - term supply to assist with an emergency need. Participating agencies are to dispense generic drugs rather than prescription brand name drugs if commercially available and consistent with the dispensing pharmacist's professional judgment and state and federal law. Non-clinical administrative services must be performed as necessary to manage and coordinate client care. These services shall include protocols, policy, and procedures for engaging clients who have not picked up their medication as prescribed.

The AIDS Pharmaceutical Assistance (local) Protocol identifies the specific ways to implement the program standards and processes inherent to this service category. The delivery of these services shall be conducted by trained culturally competent service providers. Providers are also expected to comply with applicable standards and guidelines that are relevant to individual service categories (i.e., Guidelines for the Use of Antiretroviral Agents in HIV-1-Infected Adults and Adolescents²).

Standards for pharmaceutical services for persons living with HIV/AIDS (PLWHA) are defined by the following sources:

- The Florida Board of Pharmacy
- The American Pharmacists Association Policy Manual

Eligibility Requirements for AIDS Pharmaceutical Assistance (Local)

The targeted populations for these programs are persons diagnosed with HIV/AIDS who meet the Ryan White Part A medical and financial eligibility criteria of less than or equal to 400% of the federal poverty level to obtain medications. Pharmacist, or authorized designee, shall verify client's eligibility, which is established by reviewing the certification entered in the designated HIV Human Services Software System (HIV HSSS). Pharmacist (or designee) shall perform an eligibility and financial assessment at each visit in addition to reviewing client's eligibility certification in the designated PE System. Pharmacist (or designee) will review

client's eligibility for all funding streams and services for which client may qualify. The purpose of the assessment is to ensure that the client is provided with access to all eligible services and to verify that Ryan White is the payer of last resort.

Formulary

The Ryan White Drug Formulary is a working document for practitioners to reference, which lists the medications that are available for the treatment of Ryan White eligible patients.

- Tier I is a list of Ryan White Part A approved medications.
- Tier II is a list of the ADAP medications.

Process for Additions of Medications to the Part A Formulary

The process for additions of medications to the Part A Formulary will be in accordance with the local pharmacy process. Provider may request additional medications be added to the formulary at any time by submitting a drug addition form to the Clinical Quality Management team. Final decision is remedied by the recipient office based on financial impact.

Drug Utilization Review (DUR)

At a minimum, provider agencies are to ensure that an internal DUR process is in place that mirrors the following description: "Drug utilization review (DUR) is defined as an authorized, structured, ongoing review of prescribing, dispensing and use of medication. It involves a comprehensive review of patients' prescription and medication data before, during and after dispensing to ensure appropriate medication decision-making and positive patient outcomes. As a quality assurance measure, DUR programs provide corrective action, prescriber feedback and further evaluations. DUR programs play a key role in helping managed health care systems understand, interpret, evaluate, and improve the prescribing, administration, and use of medications." DUR is classified in three categories:

1. Prospective - evaluation of a patient's drug therapy before medication is dispensed.
2. Concurrent - ongoing monitoring of drug therapy during treatment.
3. Retrospective - review of drug therapy after the patient has received the medication.

Prospective Drug Use Review

Provider agencies must have at a minimum the following procedures in place:

- A pharmacist shall review the patient record and each new and refill prescription presented for dispensing to promote therapeutic appropriateness by identifying:
 - Over-utilization or under-utilization.
 - Therapeutic duplication.
 - Drug-disease contraindications.
 - Drug-drug interactions.
 - Incorrect drug dosage or duration of drug treatment.
 - Drug-allergy interactions.
 - Clinical abuse/misuse.

- Upon recognizing any of the above, the pharmacist shall take appropriate steps to avoid or resolve the potential problems, which shall, if necessary, include consultation with the prescriber.

Patient & Medication Adherence Counseling

Providers shall offer clients medication counseling. Consenting clients shall receive counseling to assist them with their needs. Providers shall document counseling and/or other assistance in a Prescription Counseling Log.

- Upon receipt of a new or refill prescription, the pharmacist shall ensure that a verbal and printed offer to counsel is made to the patient or the patient's agent when present. If the delivery of the drugs to the patient or the patient's agent is not made at the pharmacy, the offer shall be in writing and shall provide for toll-free telephone access to the pharmacist. If the patient does not refuse such counseling, the pharmacist, or the pharmacy intern, acting under the direct and immediate personal supervision of a licensed pharmacist, shall review the patient's record and personally discuss matters which will enhance or optimize drug therapy with each patient or agent of such patient. Such discussion shall be in person, whenever practicable, or by toll-free telephonic communication and shall include appropriate elements of patient counseling. Such elements may include, in the professional judgment of the pharmacist, the following:
 - o The name and description of the drug.
 - o The dosage form, dose, route of administration, and duration of drug therapy.
 - o Intended use of the drug and expected action (if indicated by the prescribing health care practitioner).
 - o Special directions and precautions for preparation, administration, and use by the patient.
 - o Common severe side or adverse effects or interactions and therapeutic contraindications that may be encountered, including their avoidance, and the action required if they occur.
 - o Techniques for self-monitoring drug therapy.
 - o Proper storage.
 - o Prescription refill information.
 - o Action to be taken in the event of a missed dose; and
 - o Pharmacist comments relevant to the individual's drug therapy, including any other information peculiar to the specific patient or drug.
 - Patient counseling as described herein shall not be required for inpatients of a hospital or institution where other licensed health care practitioners are authorized to administer the drug(s).
 - A pharmacist shall not be required to counsel a patient or a patient's agent when the patient or patient's agent refuses such consultation.

Office of Pharmacy Affairs (OPA) Report

Ryan White AIDS Pharmaceutical Assistance funded Providers are required to enroll and report annually discounted drugs purchased through the HRSA's 340B Drug Pricing Program. Providers include Federally Qualified Health Centers, Ryan White HIV/AIDS Program recipients, and certain types of hospitals and specialized clinics. Providers must certify in writing with each monthly invoice that medications distributed through their Agreement were purchased and invoiced to Broward County at the Florida Medicaid rate, 340B Pricing (Public Health Service Pricing), or lower drug pricing. Providers are also required to complete an annual certification upon notification of the due date from OPA by Community Partnership Division (CPD). The agency on file will receive notification by the Recipient Office of the annual report due date to OPA.

Professional Requirements

The objectives for establishing standards of care for program staff is to ensure that clients have access to the highest quality of services through trained, experienced staff members. Staff hired by provider agencies will possess skills and the ability to interact with clients in a culturally and linguistically competent manner; convey necessary information to clients; manage detailed, time - sensitive, and confidential information; and complete documentation as required by their position.

- The Program Director or designee will possess experience in HIV/AIDS issues and the delivery of pharmaceutical services.
- The Provider has a current Florida pharmacy license. Dispensing pharmacists have a current Florida pharmacist's license.
- Pharmacy technician, student pharmacist, or pharmacist intern is supervised by licensed pharmacist.
- Florida Board of Pharmacy Continuing Education (CE) and Training Requirements

Provider agencies are required to complying to the following minimum requirements:

- According to the Florida Administrative Code (FAC), 30 hours of approved CE within the 24 - month period prior to the expiration date of the license. 64B16-26.103, F.A.C. Licenses expire September 30 every two years with a one-month temporary extension.
- 1-hour board-approved course on HIV/AIDS (first renewal ONLY). Sections 381.004 and 384.25, Florida Statutes (F.S.).
- 2-hour board - approved course that relates to prevention of medication errors, including a study of root-cause analysis, error reduction and prevention, and patient safety. 64B16 - 26.103 (1) (c), F.A.C.
- 2-hour board-approved course on the validation of prescriptions for controlled substances. 64B16-27.831, F.A.C.
- 10 live hours required. 64B16-26.103 (1) (m), F.A.C.

All licensed pharmacists shall complete a Board-approved 2 - hour continuing education course on the Validation of Prescriptions for Controlled Substances during the biennium ending on September 30th. A 2 - hour course shall be taken every biennium thereafter. The

course shall count towards the mandatory 30 hours of CE required for licensure renewal. All newly licensed pharmacists must complete the required course before the end of the first biennial renewal period. 64B16-27.831, F.A.C.

Adult and Adolescent Quick-Look Considerations for Biktarvy Switch Options in those with Undetectable HIV viral load

Critical Considerations:

- Assess all available Genotypes and input results into Stanford University HIV Drug Resistance Database for up-to-date interpretation (<https://hivdb.stanford.edu/hivdb/by-patterns/>)
- Assess Hepatitis B Serology as Biktarvy contains TAF/FTC which treats HBV
- Monitor Viral Load after switching every 4-6 weeks for at least 3 months before extending HIV VL monitoring
- Consider pregnancy potential in selecting switch regimen

Switch Options and Key Points:

One Pill Once per Day Potential Options

Biktarvy (B/F/TAF to Dovato (DTG/3TC)

Studies, like DYAD and SOUND, show switching from Bictegravir (B/F/TAF) to Dolutegravir/Lamivudine (DTG/3TC):

- is safe and effective for maintaining HIV suppression
- often results in less weight gain and better lipid profiles, though increased hypertension risk can occur
- might show slightly higher initial AEs
- safest if M184V/I not present but low risk if patients with M184V/I have been virally suppressed (<50 Copies/mL) for at least 6-12 months and no integrase resistance

Symtuza (DRV/COBI/FTC/TAF) (not recommended in pregnancy)

While direct switch data from Biktarvy to Symtuza is limited (most often done at emergence of INSTI resistance), real-world data and guidelines highlight the following differences:

Symtuza is known to be more forgiving of a missed dose and has a larger pill size.

Triumeq (DTG/ABC/3TC) (not recommended at conception and first trimester of Pregnancy)

Long term data from Study 1844 (168 Weeks)

(<https://pmc.ncbi.nlm.nih.gov/articles/PMC11856878/>) showed viral suppression retained (99-100%) in those who switched to Bictegravir and in those who maintained on Triumeq.

Pharmaceutical Company Patient Assistance Programs and Cost-sharing Assistance Programs: **HIV Treatment**

What is a Patient Assistance Program?

Patient assistance programs (PAPs) are run by, or in association with, pharmaceutical companies to provide free or low-cost medications to people who meet certain eligibility requirements, including federal poverty level (FPL)-based income limits. The FPL is a specific dollar amount that changes annually and is based on the number of people in the household and whether the household is in Alaska, Hawaii, or the continental U.S. PAPs typically set their income limits at a percentage point above the [annual FPL](#) (e.g., 400% of the FPL for 2025 for a family of two residing in Georgia is \$84,600 [$\$21,150 \times 4.00$]).

In addition to income requirements, PAPs are typically limited to individuals who do not have, or may not qualify for, other forms of insurance or assistance programs providing prescription drug coverage (e.g., ADAPs). Some company PAPs may be open to certain insured people with low incomes (e.g., Medicare beneficiaries) to help with affordability challenges associated with out-of-pocket medication cost requirements.

Manufacturer PAPs maintain their own eligibility criteria, electronic enrollment portals, and printable/fillable applications. Additionally, many PAPs offer expedited verification processes and first-time fills via a retail pharmacy in support of rapid antiretroviral therapy initiation. People living with HIV (or providers on their behalf) are strongly encouraged to use the toll-free numbers for the relevant PAPs if expedited verification is required.

The table on **Page 2** provides an overview of PAP contact information, drugs covered, financial eligibility, and other pertinent details.

What is a Cost-Sharing Assistance Program?

A cost-sharing assistance program (CAP) is a program operated by pharmaceutical companies to provide assistance with cost-sharing requirements (including deductibles, co-payments and co-insurance) associated with prescription drug fills/refills for clients with private health insurance. Pharmaceutical company CAPs cannot be used by individuals covered by Medicaid or Medicare. Additionally, ADAP clients should be sure to check with their ADAP program before enrolling in a pharmaceutical company CAP. An individual is eligible for the HarborPath ADAP waiting list program only if they have been deemed eligible for ADAP in their state and is verified to be on an ADAP waiting list in that state.

Patient Advocate Foundation

The Patient Advocate Foundation offers a cost-sharing and insurance premium assistance program for insured individuals whose annual income is less than 400% FPL. The yearly maximum award is \$7,500 to help cover the out-of-pocket costs incurred for HIV treatment (the award is not drug-specific). Patients must reapply every 12 months.

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HIV HEALTH SERVICES PLANNING COUNCIL MEETING GROUND RULES

1. The Council, its members, and the public recognize and respect the committee process adopted by this Council. The Council, its members, and the public recognize that full discussion and analysis of issues occurs at the committee level rather than at Council meetings.
2. Before a member can make a motion or speak in debate, the member must be recognized by the Chair as having the exclusive right to be heard at that time.
3. All speakers are expected to address the Council in a respectful manner to respect time limits, to speak briefly and to the point, and to stay on agenda. All other persons in attendance should not interrupt the speaker who is recognized by the Chair as having the floor.
4. If the member who made the motion claims the floor and has not already spoken on the question, that member is entitled to be recognized in preference to other members.
5. No person is entitled to the floor a second time in debate on the same item as long as any other person who desires the floor has not spoken on the item.
6. Speakers should restrict comments and debate to the pending question or motion. Speakers must address their remarks to the Chair and maintain a courteous tone. The Chair may impose time limits on debate or discussion to ensure efficient conduct of Council business.
7. Members should not name service providers and/or persons during any discussion unless the service provider or person is identified in the subject of the motion or agenda item. Specific concerns regarding service providers should be directed towards the Grantee, outside of the meeting.
8. Members of the public may only address the Council upon recognition by the Chair. They are subject to the same rules of conduct expected of Council members.
9. No alcohol or drug use (unless prescribed by a licensed physician), is permitted at Council meetings, grantee or support staff offices.
10. No abusive language, threats of violence, or possession of weapons are permitted in Council meetings, grantee or staff offices.
11. Repeated violation of these meeting rules may result in no further recognition of the offending member or attendee by the Chair at that meeting. Any serious breach of conduct which disrupts the Council's meeting may subject the offender to removal from the meeting, administrative or legal process.



CONSEJO DE PLANEACIÓN DE SERVICIOS DE SALUD VIH

REGLAS BÁSICAS DE LA REUNIÓN

1. Los miembros deberán aceptar y respetar el proceso de comité adoptado por este Consejo. Las discusiones y el análisis en pleno de los temas tendrán lugar a nivel de comité y no en las reuniones plenarias del Consejo.
2. Antes de que un miembro pueda iniciar una moción o de que una persona pueda hablar en un debate, el Presidente de la reunión deberá reconocer que él o ella tienen el derecho exclusivo de hablar en ese momento dado.
3. Se espera que todos los ponentes se dirijan al Consejo de una manera respetuosa, que no se interrumpa al ponente con derecho al habla en el momento, que cuando se hable se haga de forma clara y concisa, y que se mantenga la agenda.
4. Si el miembro que inicia una moción no ha hablado todavía y reclama su derecho a hablar sobre un asunto, él/ella tendrán el derecho a que con preferencia se les reconozca.
5. Nadie tendrá derecho a reclamar el habla por una segunda vez, en un debate sobre el mismo tema, cuando otra persona que no ha hablado todavía, desea hacerlo.
6. Los debates deben ceñirse a los asuntos o mociones que estén pendientes. Al hablar, los ponentes deben referirse al Presidente, y mantener un tono cortés.
7. Los miembros del público solo podrán dirigirse al Consejo cuando hayan sido reconocidos por el Presidente de la reunión. Estarán sujetos a las mismas reglas de conducta que se esperan de los miembros del Consejo. Se establecerán límites de tiempo según sea necesario para garantizar que los asuntos del Consejo cursen de manera eficiente.
8. Miembros del público sólo podrán dirigir el Consejo a partir del reconocimiento por el Presidente. Están sujetos a las mismas reglas de conducta que se espera de los miembros del Consejo.
9. No estará permitido el uso de bebidas alcohólicas o de drogas en las reuniones del Consejo y tampoco en las oficinas del personal de soporte y donatarios.
10. No está permitido el uso de lenguaje abusivo, amenazas de violencia y posesión de armas en las reuniones del Consejo ni en las oficinas del personal de soporte y donatarios.
11. La repetida violación de estas reglas básicas dará como resultado que el Presidente de la reunión deje de reconocer al derecho a participación del ofensor o miembro de la audiencia. Cualquier violación de conducta grave, que perturbe la reunión de Consejo, terminará en la remoción del ofensor, de la reunión.

Planning Council Support (PCS) Staff/‘Staff’: Provides professional staff support, meeting coordination, and information to the HIVPC, its standing and ad-Hoc Committees, Chair, and Recipient.

Clinical Quality Management (CQM) Support Staff: Provides professional support, meeting coordination, and technical assistance to assist the Recipient through analysis of performance measures and other data with the implementation of activities designed to improve patient care, health outcomes, and patient satisfaction throughout the system of care.

Provider/Sub-Recipient: Agencies contracted to provide HIV Core and Support services to consumers.
